

Scenes

Setting

The play is set in the two rooms of the Kowalski apartment in the French quarter of New Orleans. The action of the play takes place in the spring, summer and early autumn.

- Act 1 Scene 1 An evening early in May Scene 2 - The following evening Scene 3 - Many hours later Scene 4 - Early the following morning
- Act 2 Scene 1 Many weeks later Scene 2 - Later that same night
- Act 3 Scene 1 An evening in mid-September Scene 2 - The same evening Scene 3 - A few hours later Scene 4 - A couple of hours later Scene 5 - Some weeks later



Context

A Streetcar Named Desire by Tennessee Williams, first performed in 1947, is a classic American play that unfolds in the vibrant and tumultuous setting of New Orleans. The story revolves around Blanche DuBois, a fragile and troubled woman who moves in with her sister, Stella, and her brother-in-law, Stanley Kowalski. As the dynamics between the characters develop, the play explores themes of sex and gender roles, mental instability, and mortality in the face of the gritty realities of the post-World War II era.

Set against the backdrop of a gritty New Orleans neighbourhood, the play captures the heat, sensuality, and social tensions of the time and place. The sultry atmosphere intensifies the conflict between Blanche's illusions of grandeur and Stanley's raw, primal force. Tennessee Williams masterfully delves into the complexities of human relationships, exposing the fragility of the human psyche and the destructive power of desire.

A Streetcar Named Desire has had a significant impact on American theatre and culture. The play has been adapted into multiple film and television productions, with the 1951 film directed by Elia Kazan starring Vivien Leigh as Blanche and Marlon Brando as Stanley earning critical acclaim. The enduring relevance of the play lies in its exploration of universal themes and its iconic characters that continue to resonate with audiences today.

Streetcar Speak

The French Quarter:

The French Quarter, also known as Vieux Carré, is the oldest and most famous neighbourhood in New Orleans, Louisiana

Poor Boy Sandwich:

The po' boy sandwich originated in New Orleans during the late 1920s. It was created by former streetcar conductors, who opened a restaurant and offered free sandwiches to striking streetcar workers.

Plantation:

Historically, a plantation refers to a large estate or farm where crops such as cotton, sugar cane, tobacco or rice are grown

Sugar Tit:

Homemade pacifier used to soothe babies. It consisted of a piece of cloth filled with sugar, molasses, or honey, tied into a small bundle.

Rosenkavalier (or "Knight of the Rose":

A romantic figure who presents a rose to a lady, symbolising love and courtship.

Ioie De Vivre:

A cheerful enjoyment of life; an exultation of spirit

Voulez-yous coucher avec moi ce soir?:

Would you like to sleep with me tonight?

Bromo:

Short for Bromo-Seltzer, a brand of antacid used to relieve pain occurring together with heartburn, upset stomach, or acid indigestion.

Flores Para Los Muertos: Flowers for the Dead

Coronas Para Los Muertos: Wreaths for the Dead

Quinine:

A bitter crystalline compound present in cinchona bark, used as a tonic and formerly as an antimalarial drug.
